



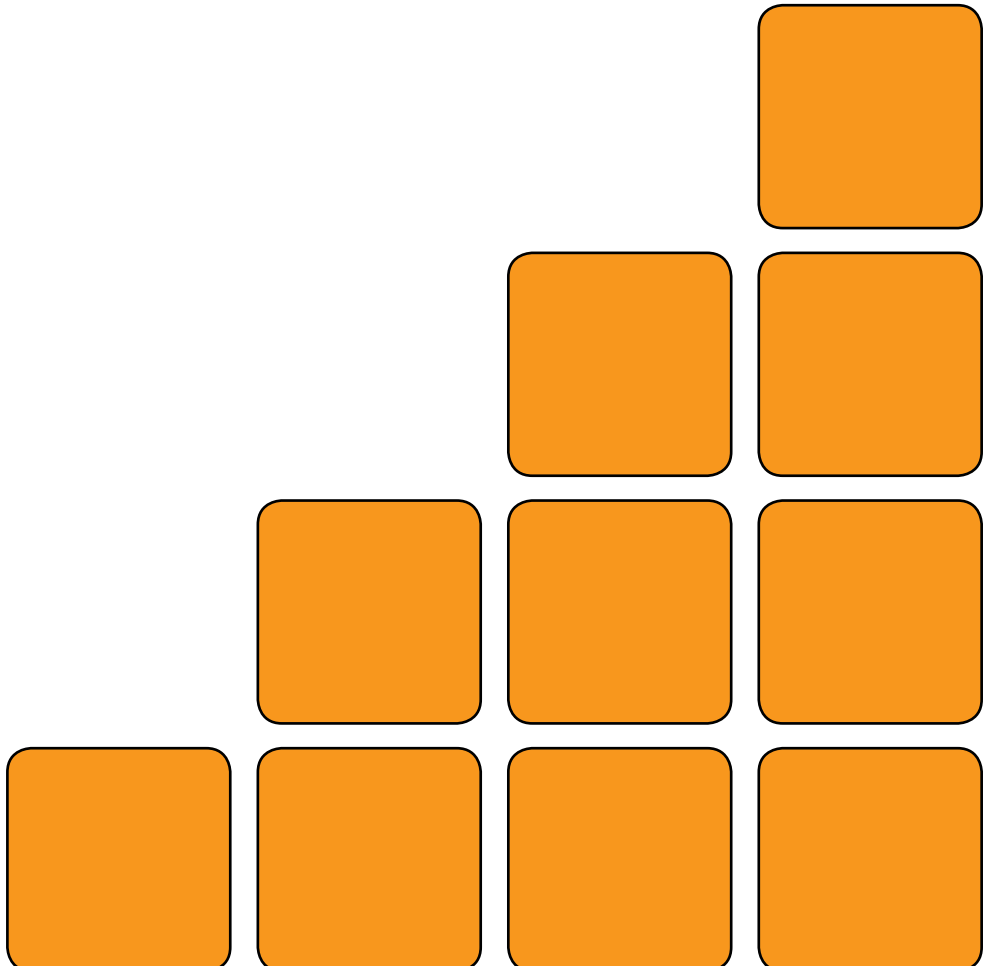

Create a variety of permed effects

This unit is about combining, adapting and personalising a range of sectioning and winding techniques to achieve a variety of fashionable permed effects. Permed effects include root lifted, waved, corkscrewed and textured curls. The ability to work with sensitised hair is also required.

To carry out this unit, you will need to maintain a high level of health, safety and hygiene throughout your work. You will also need to maintain a professional personal appearance and demonstrate effective communication skills.

The main outcomes of this unit are:

1. Maintain effective and safe methods of working when perming and neutralising hair
2. Prepare for perming
3. Create a variety of permed effects

Evidence requirements

1. *Environment*
Evidence for this unit may be gathered within the workplace or realistic working environment (RWE).
2. *Simulation*
Simulation is not allowed in this unit.
3. *Observation outcomes*
Competent performance of Observation outcomes must be demonstrated on **at least three occasions. This must include two different sectioning and winding techniques, one of which must be carried out on sensitised hair.**

Assessor observations, witness testimonies and products of work are likely to be the most appropriate sources of performance evidence. Professional discussion may be used as supplementary evidence for those criteria that do not naturally occur.

Assessed observations should not be carried out on the same day for the same learning outcome. There should be sufficient time between assessments for reflection and personal development.

You need to meet the same standard on a regular and consistent basis. Separating the assessments by a period of at least two weeks is recommended as competence must be demonstrated on a consistent and regular basis.

4. *Range*
All ranges must be practically demonstrated or other forms of evidence produced to show they have been covered.
5. *Knowledge outcomes*
There must be evidence that you possess all the knowledge and understanding listed in the Knowledge section of this unit. In most cases this can be done by professional discussion and/or oral questioning. Other methods, such as projects, assignments and/or reflective accounts may also be used.
6. *Tutor/Assessor guidance*
Your tutor **must** refer to the '**Habia Assessment Strategy**' when delivering this unit to ensure that you cover all the requirements for this unit. This can be found on www.vtct.org.uk under the relevant qualification page.

You will be guided by your tutor/assessor on how to achieve learning outcomes and cover ranges in this unit. All outcomes and ranges must be achieved.
7. *External paper*
Knowledge and understanding in this unit will be assessed by an external paper. **There is one external paper that must be achieved.**

Achieving observations and range

Achieving observation outcomes

Your assessor will observe your performance of practical tasks. The minimum number of competent observations required is indicated in the Evidence requirements section of this unit.

Criteria may not always naturally occur during a practical observation. In such instances you will be asked questions to demonstrate your competence in this area. Your assessor will document the criteria that have been achieved through professional discussion and/or oral questioning. This evidence will be recorded by your assessor in written form or by other appropriate means.

Your assessor will sign off a learning outcome when all criteria have been competently achieved.

Achieving range

The range section indicates what must be covered. Ranges should be practically demonstrated as part of an observation. Where this is not possible other forms of evidence may be produced. All ranges must be covered.

Your assessor will document the portfolio reference once a range has been competently achieved.

Learning outcome 1

You must be able to:

- a. Maintain your responsibilities for health and safety throughout the service
- b. Prepare your client to meet salon's requirements and protect your client's clothing throughout the service
- c. Wear personal protective equipment when using perming and neutralising chemicals
- d. Position your client to meet the needs of the service without causing them discomfort
- e. Ensure your own posture and position whilst working minimises fatigue and the risk of injury
- f. Keep your work area clean and tidy throughout the service
- g. Use working methods that:
 - Minimise wastage of products
 - Minimise the risk of cross-infection
 - Make effective use of your working time
 - Ensure the use of clean resources
 - Minimise the risk of harm or injury to yourself and others
 - Promote environmental and sustainable working practices
- h. Ensure your personal hygiene, protection and appearance meets accepted industry and organisational requirements
- i. Follow workplace and suppliers' or manufacturers' instructions for the safe use of equipment, materials and products
- j. Dispose of waste materials
- k. Complete the service within a commercially viable time

Learning outcome 2

Be able to prepare for perming

You must be able to:

- a. Ask your client questions to identify if they have any contra-indications to perming services
- b. Record your client's responses to questioning
- c. Conduct following manufacturers' instructions and recognised industry procedures
- d. Record the outcomes of tests on your client's record card
- e. Choose products, tools and equipment based on the results of tests, consultation with your client and influencing factors
- f. Prepare products, following manufacturers' instructions
- g. Protect your client's hair and skin prior to the perming service

Learning outcome 3

Be able to create a variety of permed effects

You must be able to:

- a. Explore the variety of potential looks with your client using the relevant visual aids
- b. Base your recommendations on an accurate evaluation for your client's hair and its potential to achieve the effects required
- c. Use products and techniques taking into account influencing factors
- d. Personalise your sectioning and winding techniques to take account of factors that will influence the desired effect
- e. Adapt your methods of working and use of products to meet the needs of clients with sensitised hair
- f. Confirm the required degree of curl has been achieved by taking development test curls at suitable times throughout the perming process
- g. Take remedial action to resolve issues that occur during the perming service
- h. Ensure development is stopped and the hair is effectively neutralised once the desired permed effect has been achieved
- i. Use creative finishing techniques to achieve the desired permed effect
- j. Ensure the finished permed effect complements your client's features and enhances their personal image and that of the salon
- k. Confirm your client's satisfaction with the finished effect
- l. Give your client advice and recommendations on the service provided
